PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

New Councillor: Due to a resignation there is a vacancy on Council. If you would like to become more involved in village issues and to help manage the council's property and finances then please contact the parish clerk on 620329.

2013/14 Precept: For the 2011/12 financial year council significantly reduced the parish precept from the £52,000 required to run the council to £33,000 as a one-off action, and to fund the shortfall from reserves. For the coming 2012/13 financial year, recognising the national economic climate, council decided yet again to retain this same low level of precept. Helped by a projected underspend during the course of this year it has been possible to hold the precept increase to only 8%, to £36,266, the shortfall again being funded from council reserves. This precept represents a charge of less than £60 pa per Band D household. For 2013/14 and beyond a five year financial plan has been developed, aimed at bringing the spending of the council and future precepts into closer alignment whilst ensuring adequate reserves.

Parish Plan to Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr Granger gave an update on progress on matters associated with the Localism Act and with the Parish Plan. She noted that the Parish Plan has now been agreed by residents at the recent public meeting and final checks are being carried out prior to publication. This plan will have the potential to give the village more control over its future and will form the basis for a Neighbourhood Plan. In addition, council decided to take another early step in establishing a Neighbourhood Plan by applying to PDNPA to designate the parish of Bradwell as a Neighbourhood Area.

Road Closure: Notification was received during the month that Severn Trent Water (STW) had been granted a temporary road closure by Derbyshire County Council (DCC) to allow it to renew the water mains from the Travellers' Rest to Gore Lane. This would permit a total road closure at Brough for about 4 weeks, probably in January, and traffic control on the remaining stretches of road for about 6 weeks. Although council recognised that this work is required and will be of benefit to the parish, it was very concerned at the timing (possible snow and ice preventing use of alternate routes out of the village) and the adverse impact this work would have on Bradwell residents and businesses. It therefore convened a meeting with DCC & STW at Matlock. The meeting explored a number of alternatives to the proposed scheme, mainly in terms of the routes and timings. We have been informed that the work will now take place from mid-May, with the road closure from 3rd June. We believe this change will reduce the possibility of the village being cut off during adverse weather.

Youth Club: The Youth Club is now operating smoothly with around 15 members attending per week and a successful Hallowe'en disco was enjoyed by all. Given that the Youth Club Leader is on temporary secondment from DCC and there is a single Youth Assistant, council agreed to the Youth Club committee's proposal that a permanent Youth Leader and a

second Youth Assistant should be recruited.

DDDC Matters: DDDC Cllr Furness updated council on the latest position regarding the performance of the new contract for domestic refuse collection.. He stated that a) the new contractor was struggling to meet its targets and many houses are not receiving an adequate service and b) he had attended a meeting with the contractor who stated that they would have the scheme on track within the next two weeks.

Extra signage: Following representations from residents and the parish council, DCC has agreed to install additional road signage near Brookside/Church Street to discourage HGVs and coaches from attempting to drive up Towngate and Hol-lowgate. It will be a few months before this signage is installed.

BRADWELL 100 YEARS AGO

On Christmas Eve the two brass bands, the 'Old' and the 'Coronation' combined forces to parade around the village playing a programme of seasonal music including 'Peace o'er the World'. It is recorded that the evening was beautifully fine with bright moonlight although there was a cold wind blowing until the small hours when it died away and Christmas morning was fine and mild. It is to be hoped that history will repeat itself 100 years on. Before that the Primitive Methodists had presented an operetta for girls entitled The Enchanted Glen by W C Cooper. The operetta was performed in the Schoolroom with Nelly Redfern conducting and Lily Morton at the piano. The leading roles were taken by Polly Jennings: Dame Grumpus (the village terror); Clara Cooper: Nora (an orphan) and Clementine Ross: Mab (Queen of the Fairies). The plot is suitably one for Christmas. Dame Grumpus has adopted orphan Nora who she treats harshly. Nora is carried off by gypsies but she escapes across a moor following a Will-o-the-Wisp and reaches the court of Queen Mab. Nora is missed by the village girls who set off to find her wandering into the Enchanted Glen where the Queen puts them on trial for trespass. When Nora tells the Queen the real cause of the mischief the Dame is summoned and shown the error of her ways. The event raised £6 16s 6d for the Gas Installation Fund. (Clementine Ross' brother Charles is commemorated at the Menin Gate War Memorial at Ypres and on the Bradwell War Memorial, having died on 12th July 1917 aged 22.) Just before Christmas the visiting Liberal Club took on the Conservative Club in a billiard match consisting of 6 games played 120 up. The visitors won 4-2 with their successful players being J & C Bancroft, P Dakin and A Hill with G. Kaye and J Daniel winning for the Conservatives. The landlord of the Bull's Head successfully defended a charge of watering down his whisky. This seems like a serious charge but at the time it appears to have been common practise to buy over-strength whisky and to 'break it down' with water prior to sale. Henry Walker Lee admitted that he had failed to use a hygrometer to test his whisky but he had followed the written guidelines for breaking down and the case was dismissed.

MR ALAN WYTKIN

Alan Wytkin died in hospital in Gorleston on 3rd August aged 61 years. Born in Bradwell, the son of Frank and Peggy Wytkin he attended the two Bradwell schools and then Hope Valley College. He spent most of his working life as a heavy goods vehicle driver working for, among others, Brian Charles, Robinsons and High Peak Skips. He also worked for a time in the yard gang at the Blue Circle Cement works. Due to a vascular disease he had to stop working at a relatively early age. Alan enjoyed fishing, motor cycling and socialising. He leaves his father Frank, sisters Ann, Katherine and Denise and brother Stephen. His mother Peggy pre-deceased him. Cremation was at Gorleston Crematorium on 16th August.

CHRISTMAS VOUCHERS

At the AGM of the Bradwell Well Dressing Group in order to simplify and improve the Christmas Voucher scheme, the following changes to the rules for the scheme were agreed.

1. All recipients should be aged 65 years and over, on or before, the 31st December 2012.
2. Each qualifying person will receive a £5 voucher. Past recipients of the vouchers who are not 65 year of age will not receive a voucher until they reach the age of 65.
3. The issuing of vouchers (as in the previous rules) will be dependent upon adequate funds being available.
4. The scheme will be reviewed each year.

In order to keep our information up to date, if you have become eligible to receive a voucher this year, or if you are eligible and have not received a voucher in the past, or you know of someone who is eligible but has not received voucher in the past, please let a member of the Well Dressing Committee know, or contact the secretary Peter Kobayashi on 621459.
