HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

It is seven years since the last housing needs survey was carried out. To ensure we are using the latest information when preparing the Neighbourhood Plan, the Parish Council and Dales District Housing are organising a Housing Needs Survey, to take place in September. Full details will be distributed in next months *Bradwell News*. If you, your family, or friends are likely to need, or want to move, to a different sized affordable home please make sure they are aware and that they participate in the survey. The results will play a major role in determining the predicted number of affordable houses which can be built in Bradwell during the next 15 years. A postcard will be included in the September edition of the newsletter explaining what is needed and telling you how you can respond to the survey. PC NOTES**Neighbourhood Plan (NP)**

The latest public meeting was held on Tuesday 8th July in the Memorial Hall, to review progress made so far and enable residents to comment on the interim findings of the group. Around 25 residents attended with good feedback, positive responses and additional suggestions being received. The group has been trained in NP policy writing and some initial drafting of the required policies has already commenced. It is now planned to convene a series of workshops over the coming months to focus on writing these policies to the level of detail required by PDNPA. This will continue over the summer period in order that they will be ready for submission to the PDNPA by December. In the meantime, all information so far received from the many survey responses, interviews with groups and businesses and from many other sources is being carefully stored to provide the required comprehensive audit trail.

Youth Club

The Youth Club in Newburgh Hall is now closed and all the furniture and equipment has either been disposed of or stored pending the availability of alternative premises. The parish council is very keen to ensure that the Youth Club should continue and is urgently seeking alternative premises in close proximity to the centre of the village. If anyone knows of suitable premises, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Consultations

Over recent months and years it has become increasingly common for partner authorities and other bodies to involve the parish council in consultations regarding different aspects of their service provision, usually with a view to identifying local priorities or in enabling reduced costs. Sometimes these consultations simply involve completing surveys but at other times meetings are convened. For example, recently councillors met with DCC officers to discuss improvements to drains and gullies and to improve road signage in order to prevent inappropriate vehicular access to narrow village lanes.

Consultation with Police & Fire Services

Given the recent proposal to close the Bradwell Fire Station (now thankfully in abeyance) and the fact that the Police Office on Netherside has already been closed, the parish council is keen to maintain contact with, and to work with, the Emergency Services to ensure the best possible outcome for the village. Communication is continuing and we will keep you informed as these discussions progress.

Village Emergency / Trauma Centre

Following initial contact from Severn Trent regarding the possible implications of flash flooding for the village, preliminary investigation work has commenced on the establishment of a village Emergency / Trauma centre intended to be a central point for information dissemination and the provision of assistance in the event of any emergency incident.

Additional Bus Stops

The request for new Bus Stops in the village was considered by council. After a wide ranging discussion it was decided that council does not support this request and the Clerk has written to County Council (DCC) to confirm this view.

DDDC Litter Bins

District Council (DDDC) consulted with the parish council on proposals to rationalise (& reduce) the number of litter & dog litter bins it provides around the village. Council considered this proposal and whilst agreeing with the principle involved and with the majority of suggestions proposed, it does object to some of the proposed changes. DDDC has already been informed of the council's view.

LIBRARY SERVICE

Bradwell's travelling library service is, like many Derbyshire County services, under threat. The present fortnightly service – already half of what it was only four years ago – will probably be cut to half a day once a month. But there is one way of changing this proposal: Councillor Judith Twigg has told us that if enough concerted pressure is brought to bear from the village, she will feel able to argue for what she called a vital service to young and old alike. BRADWELL'S BELGIAN REFUGEES - Continued

We left the story last time with a group of ladies being dedicated to food collections in the village.

For this purpose Bradwell was divided into 4 districts. Against this background there was an ongoing effort at fund raising. One of the earliest of these took place in October 1914 when Isaac Hall recited his War Poem 'The Kaiser and the Bradda Lads'. A thousand copies of the poem went on sale and this was followed by a further 2000 copies. The Committee's accounts for 1915 showed that sales of the poem raised £12 11s 1d. In modern terms this equates to £1,226 43p. Indeed, the total income for that year was £218 13s (in modern terms £21,360 18p). There were a number of concerts for the fund raising and at one of these Miss Nellie Hall sang the Brabançonne (Belgian National Anthem) accompanied by Miss Vulhapp, a resident of Bamford. One item on the expenditure side of the accounts was the purchase of 20 Flemish phrase books. From the Minute Book of the Bradwell Belgian Relief Committee and contemporary newspaper cuttings we are able to piece together something of the histories of the Belgians who lived in Bradwell during the First World War. The house and their occupants were:

1. The Bungalow (now Moorlow Tor) on Granby Road then the property of Mr H Hogkin was occupied for a brief period by M Fontaine, his wife and two daughters, one of the first groups of Belgians to arrive in Bradwell. Their stay was quite a short one because M Fontaine was found work at the Belgian Consulate in Sheffield.
2. Hill Head Cottage the property of Mr Hibbs and occupied by Henrie Vermaelen, wife and two little children from Louvain. Henrie was a tractor driver who worked for a while at John Hadfield and Sons. Later he joined the Belgian Army and was wounded. From the front Henrie wrote a letter of thanks (in

Flemish) to the Belgian Relief Committee for the £2 provided to allow his wife to buy a pair of spectacles. It seems very likely that the stories that the Vermaelins would have brought to Bradwell of German atrocities in Louvain encouraged more Bradwell men to enlist.

3. Eden Tree House the property of the late Dr Clegg and occupied by an unidentified father and two daughters (possibly Cajetan Cöet but see 5).
4. Mrs Nancy(?) Bradwell of Church Street entertained Mme Selhorst for a while. Norbert Selhorst her husband, a mitrailleur - machine gunner, was fighting with the Belgian Army. Previously Mme Selhorst had lodged in Hill Head Cottage with Mme Vermaelen
5. Moorbrook, Moorbrook Lane property of Mr Harries occupied at one time by Mme Selhorst (she seems to have moved around quite a bit) and probably also the family of Cajetan Cöet. Cajetan was a railway worker from Antwerp.
6. House unknown but occupied by the family of Leon van Egeran, mitrailleur. Leon visited his family at least twice when on leave. On one occasion in 1915 he brought with him a complete 37 mm German 'pom pom' shell and the nose of a 77 mm German shell. The items were on show in Mrs John Hall's shop window together with two German helmets brought by Sgt Major Moorhouse.
7. House unknown but Auguste van Achteen was reported to have visited his family when he was on leave in Bradwell. In 1920, the King of the Belgians (King Albert I who had commanded his country's forces throughout the First World War) presented his country's 'Ordre de la Couronne' to Joseph Ash of Heatherfield, Jeffery Lane, in recognition of Joseph's work in Bradwell on behalf of Belgian refugees.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

These objectives, which were endorsed at the meeting with minor amendments, will form the basis of Policies which will be written over the summer. The policies will put in place our planning ideas which Peak Park planners have to follow in the future. One key area not yet resolved is the village boundary for future development. To make sure we get it right there will be drop in sessions organised over the summer, so watch the notice boards and Bradda.org for dates. The next public meeting will be in September at a date to be announced.
